OUR PASTORAL AREA

Patron – Saint Monica

The **Pastoral Area Council** (PAC) is made up of clergy and lay representatives from each parish. The Dean is Rev Mgr Provost Seán Healy and the Chair is Joan Barham. It meets bi-monthly to communicate parish news, strengthen relationships and progress pastoral area-wide initiatives.

Bishop David writes: 'The Pastoral Area Council is an opportunity to focus our reflection about what it means to be a missionary disciple. The Church is an apostolic community that receives the life of the Spirit for mission.'

As parishes Bishop David asks us: 'To be generous; in your prayer of intercession for the parish communities within your Pastoral Area, in your seeking the way forward to encourage a communion of collaboration between these communities, in your vision for the way forward and how we can reach out in welcome to those who are called to belong to the Body of Christ but need our encouragement and accompaniment.'

Pastoral Area Councils exist to serve the mission of the Church in their local area. They offer opportunities to undertake new projects together and enhance the life of individual communities. They connect people across a locality, sharing experience, talent and opportunities for growth. They facilitate the fulfilment of our baptismal vocation.

Bishop David says: 'A Pastoral Area is not a set of identical units, with each congregation having to function in the same way. As St Paul writes, we are a body, with different skills and functions, because of its variety, not despite it, the Pastoral Area can be a representation of the Body of Christ. The role of the Council, and the Dean and Chair in particular, is to hold that tension creatively and use it for the building of the Kingdom.'

SOUTH BUCKS PASTORAL AREA PASTORAL VISITATION

First of all, my sincere thanks to you all for the kindly welcome, warm hospitality and generosity during the weekends of the pastoral visits. Hopefully, having me around was not too burdensome. I thoroughly enjoyed being with you, the lovely meals we shared together; on two occasions, with parishioners. The visitations helped me to grow in my appreciation and affection towards you all.

I want to encourage you Fathers to look after yourselves and the parish houses. You deserve to be looked after and cared for. It is not a neglect of Gospel simplicity to exercise good stewardship and to make sure the presbytery is a homely place of some modest comfort for yourselves. Please do work with your finance committees, the diocesan COO and property office, to make improvements and make sure the house is warm and comfortable. The same might be said of the churches. Again, if there are needs or particular projects you have in mind to make the churches, especially the sanctuary, places of beauty and fit for liturgical celebration, don't be afraid to talk with the COO about making plans. Again, parish properties might need thinking through. I am thinking of the presbyteries at Great Missenden and St Wulstan's High Wycombe.

My overall sense is that you have good parish communities here in the South Bucks pastoral area. It is difficult to see everything in the course of a twenty-four hour period, but there were some fine examples of catechesis, social needs outreach, pastoral care, prayer and spirituality groups of one kind and another. I very much enjoyed the liturgical music available in this part of the Diocese. There were some novel ideas for raising funds, for the parish and for various social needs. There may be more jams and chutneys for sale at the back of your churches than any other part of the Diocese. Also, there is an awareness of how elderly some communities are. What will this parishes look like in five and ten years time?

South Bucks proves to be a most interesting part of the Church in this country. Our parishes are very near to those in the Archdioceses of Westminster and Birmingham, the Dioceses of Portsmouth and Arundel and Brighton. There is some movement between the communities of these dioceses, and that makes for a most interesting dynamic at times. I hadn't appreciated this before the visitations.

There is some fluidity between communities. On more than a few occasions, I met with people who were not strangers to me. I had met them in liturgies in other communities. This fluidity is something which is very much part of our ecclesial experience in these times. On some occasions this was because certain Mass times suited their family arrangements that weekend. On other occasions it was just because they fancied a change. This certainly got me thinking. For example, is it worth arranging some "confessional swaps" occasionally? There may be other ways in which parishes can cooperate together. It would be profitable to see how parishes may work together with catechetical programmes. The *Emmaus talks* seem to be successful. They are a wonderful expression of reflection on important teaching themes across the pastoral area.

The recent carol singing in High Wycombe was an excellent and non-too threatening idea. It involved doughnuts, handing out sheets with Christmas Service times and even some parishioners receiving some basic formation in answering any questions which may arise.

Another aspect of things, which gave me much food for thought, concerns the future of parishes and parish combinations. Chesham and Chesham Bois are hardly a mile from each other. We all hope Fr Dave and Fr Giacomo will be at Chesham for a number of years to come. What happens when they move on? Should we consider an alternative arrangement to the one in place presently? What about High Wycombe? Should there be a time when this becomes one parish with three churches? What happens to Bourne End when Sr Winifred steps back from her excellent pastoral role there? Should we be thinking about reducing our numbers of parishes to accommodate the coming times when there will be less clergy available for parish ministry.

It would be imprudent if we didn't think about the future. That said, I do not want to be trapped into any sense of despair or anxiety about this. Just now, I want to be very positive about what the Church is doing in this part of the Diocese. There is much to celebrate and give thanks for. I recognise a very certain and firm foundation to build upon. How do we take things forward? In this regard, I want to encourage you to reflect upon those three familiar words by now, communion, participation and mission. Perhaps through the agency of the Pastoral Area Council, we can begin some synodal conversations around building a consensus about what these things might look like here in South Bucks.
